CONFERENCE OVERVIEW

International Disaster Management Conference is celebrating its Silver Anniversary in 2004 with an exciting program that has been designed to meet the educational needs of all personnel and agencies involved with emergency preparedness, response, and disaster recovery. Our Planning Committee acknowledges the unique role that the myriad of first responders, response agencies, and communities play in planning for, responding to, and mitigating disasters.

Our theme, "Preparing Freedom's Lifelines..." is evident throughout all of this year's educational programs and tracks. This past year has presented the emergency management community with several challenging events. These events, although devastating, have produced an opportunity to learn from adversity and serve as the basis for many of our educational sessions.

The Planning Committee worked hard to recognize the diversity of the myriad of disaster management and response agencies and their unique educational needs. We have designed the Disaster 2004 Program to meet these educational needs while challenging the attendees to prepare for the unthinkable.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- Following completion of the conference, participants will be able to:
- > Appraise the various roles and challenges of first responders, disaster managers, health care professionals and other public safety officials in the management of disaster response.
 - > Through lessons learned in several recent domestic and international disaster events, apply improved techniques to better prepare communities for future disaster responses.
 - > Apply emergency management principles to weapons of mass destruction events.
 - > Identify the resources needed for emergency services to deal with weapons of mass destruction events.
 - > Identify the process for preparing hospital's to deal with chemical and radiation incidents.
 - > Identify the resources a hospital would need to deal with chemical and radiation incidents.
 - > Identify the public health issues related to the aftermath of an epidemic or bioterrorism event.
 - > Explain how to plan and respond to events involving man-made and natural disaster events.
 - > Explain why disaster planning must include healthcare institutions, public health organizations and healthcare professionals.
 - > Explain the impact on hospital function that non-hospital healthcare organizations and institutions can have during disaster operations.
 - > Explain the process of epidemiological surveillance and its use in disaster preparedness.
 - > Explain the logistical planning needed to manage a disaster event.
 - > Discuss how panic may affect the public in a terrorist or disaster event.
 - > Explain the process for realistic planning for EMS response to weapons of mass destruction incidents.
 - > Discuss the concepts of preparing for the needs of first responders and their families pre-incident.
 - > Discuss the utilization of injury simulation for disaster preparedness.
 - > Explain the toxicological effects that can result from a structural collapse incident.
 - > Discuss the objectives for pairing of disaster search dogs with Paramedics.
 - > Explain how to simplify and clarify the mass decontamination process.
 - > Discuss the implications of infectious disease epidemics in hospital and

prehospital health care systems.

- > Discuss the benefits of virtual warehousing for a disaster incident.
- > Discuss the use of technology in the command and control process during a disaster event.
- > Discuss the use of robot technology for disaster response.
- > Discuss the value of planning for disaster management through simulation and drills.
